




Staff:

This took a lot of teamwork and all were successful. We debriefed about the frustrations and difficulty and how eventually they all overcame it to be successful.

At our District Day training staff were led by Nikarre Redcoff from SCOE on PBIS (Positive Behavioral Intervention Supports). They were given time to plan uses for this on site.

Ms. Kaufman: The strings music elective ended the quarter with two short assembly performances for elementary and charter students on Tuesday, October 17. The performances featured music fit for a funeral (the theme from Mahler's Symphony No. 1 - 3rd movement) and a wedding (an excerpt from Pachelbel's Canon in D). We also created an original piece of music on the spot by improvising a short pattern using the D major pentatonic scale with a lively backing track to help us keep the steady beat. This musical improv activity is called "The Infinity Loop." Our performance featured five violins, one viola, two cellos, one guitar, one trombone, a piano, and an electronic keyboard. 
In 7th grade science we have been learning about levers in the body! We are also constructing catapults for Halloween, to shoot marshmallows at zombies!!

Ms. Woods:


MWCS 8th Grade ELA/History -In ELA we have been learning about narrative stories, elements of a plot, types of conflict, story devices, types of characters, and figurative language. We did this first through interactive notebooks, then by reading the novel <u>Lord of the Flies</u>, by William Golding, and will be completing the Unit with each student writing their own narrative. Classroom discussions have been rich while reading this allegory novel. Students will also be completing a final novel project that they can choose from a list of twelve options.








In History students just finished learning about the Declaration of Independence. A simulation of taxation without representation was done in class so that students could empathize with the colonists. Students just finished creating comic strips of the events leading up to the American Revolution and will now begin learning about the various battles and events of the Revolution. Then we will begin learning about the formation of this great country, our constitution, the preamble, and our branches of government.

8th Grade Math

We wrapped up our geometry unit (always a favorite of the students!). As part of the unit, students completed tessellation (tiling) ar). They are also so creative and came out wonderfully! We reviewed ratios with a fun, hands-on activity, to prepare for using ratios and proportions. In preparation for their test, students prepared a study guide together as a class. We will move on to angles in our next unit.



8th Grade Science

We have continued our exploration of space. We created our own scale models of the solar system. It was extra exciting to learn about a space phenomenon and then witness it in real-life (sort of, of course it was cloudy!) when we had an annular solar eclipse on the 14th! Students completed their month-long observations of the Moon. The students have been extremely open-minded about the science curriculum pilot we are testing and have enjoyed the hands-on activities.




Forensics

We wrapped up the quarter with learning about DNA. We extracted DNA from strawberries! We also learned a little about what a forensic anthropologist does. Our final unit of study was on arson. We completed the course with a fun and competitive game of Jeopardy.

From Mr. Carusone:

The students have been creating scary stories. For this activity students picked their own partner or triad. They were given 3 story starters to choose from. They were to write the exposition of the story (setting, character introduction and conflict. Each partner picked their own and were given 5 minutes to start. Then they switched chromebooks and were given 5 minutes to continue their partner's story. This went back and forth each time the writer was to add imagery or figurative language. Each time a switch was made a new color or font was used to denote who was typing.
